UCAS DATA

Beginning with the 2011-2012 school year, all schools in Utah will be evaluated for their effectiveness based upon each student's individual progress. The UCAS system is very complex and cannot be explained in this short space but it is a wonderful tool to assess how well all schools are doing in meeting the individual needs of each student. Fort Herriman Middle School attained a UCAS score of 514 out of 600. With a little more growth in language arts and math, our score could be 547. The scoring system used to establish a school-wide score is very complex. A 514 score puts us in the 85th percentile in the State; a 547 score puts us in the 94th percentile. We are very happy with these results and proud of the progress each of our students is making.





Schools to Watch

One of the greatest accomplishments Fort Herriman has achieved is its status as a National School to Watch. Only 300 of 7800 middle schools nation-wide have this high distinction. We were designated in 2010 and are currently working on our re-designation application. Each school must re-apply every three years. Fort Herriman must demonstrate highly functioning and effective programs that promote academic excellence, are socially equitable, and developmentally appropriate for middle level learners. Our site review is February 12th and we are excited to showcase the many wonderful things that Fort Herriman does to support our students.

Sub for Santa / Utah Food Bank Success

Fort Herriman has a great tradition of giving. The Herriman and Riverton communities have been very supportive to our causes each year. This year during our sub for Santa fundraising, Fort Herriman Middle School students brought in almost \$10,000 and 14,000 pounds of food. The value of the food comes to around \$32,000 dollars so our total this year was nearly \$42,000 dollars – all in nine days. This is an outstanding accomplishment for our students. All food was picked up by the Utah Food Bank and will be used to provide for families in need. On February 6th, Fort Herriman will be recognized at a special luncheon in celebration of the

school's contribution. For five of the past eight years, Fort Herriman has been the single largest school donator for the entire state.

With our sub for Santa money we were able to support five families in the school boundaries who were in need of help this year. We were also able to donate \$2,000 to Jordan Credit Union's Warm the Soles Program which provides shoes and socks for children in the Midvale and Sandy boys and girls clubs. Finally, we were able to buy \$1,000 worth of brand new toys for the Riverton IHC children's wing to give away as presents to kids in the hospital during Christmas.



Crêpe

1 C. flour

2 T. sugar

¼ tsp. salt

3 eggs

CTE Month – Celebrating Career and Technical Education

The Career and Technical Education Department celebrated CTE month during the Month of January! School Safety Planning

In light of the tragic events in December at Sandy Hook Elementary School, Jordan School District Administration, local school administrations, and local responders have taken the time to review our own emergency procedures. Jordan School District has a uniform emergency response system that schools follow. Although some parts of the system are customized to the needs of the school and the school size, the overall structure is the same. Fort Herriman practices these drills and includes responders in the drills for their own practice and advises on what we could improve upon. We will be reviewing our emergency procedures with the School Community Council at our upcoming meeting on February 20th. If there is a situation where Fort Herriman Middle School has to go into lock down please remember the following:

First, coming to the school will only create more problems. All entrances will be closed to the school and access will not be allowed. Responder's soul focus should be upon the safety of our children.

Second, the school will not be answering the phone during a lock down. Also, we would ask that you try to limit communication with your students via cell phone. We understand your number one priority in any situation is to ensure that your student is safe. It is also our number one priority. We will need student's undivided attention to listen to procedures and instructions. We have advised the students that calling on cell phones during a lock down is not acceptable behavior as the talking could jeopardize the safety of all students. ABSOLUTE SILENCE IN A LOCK DOWN IS IMPERATIVE.

Finally, there are procedures in place for the orderly pick up and return of all students to their parents. Students will not just simply be released to go.

We would ask for your cooperation with these items in the event that we would need to go into a lock down situation. All parents will be updated via the SKYLERT system, which will include emails, texts and phone calls.
